Over the last six years as the leader of OLA, one of the many strengths we have managed to develop at OLA has been our strong sense of community and valuesbased education. Catholic Identity (Discipleship)

As mentioned previously, Catholic education and faith is undeniably the core learning area at OLA. This emphasis on faith-based education is deeply intertwined with the school's strategic plan. OLA recognizes the importance of instilling a strong foundation in Catholic teachings and traditions. Working closely with the OLA Parish, the school ensures that students have the opportunity to grow in their understanding of the Catholic faith through religious education lessons, sacramental preparation and celebrations, and participation in Mass and other religious activities such as supporting various community groups e.g. St Vincent de Paul appeals, **Archbishop's LifeLink,** Wheelchair for Kids, Caritas (Project Compassion), Jeans Friday and many more.

The partnership between OLA School and the OLA Parish is a unique and vital aspect of the school's identity. This collaboration with Fr Ken allows for a seamless integration of faith into every facet of a student's educational experience. Students benefit from the guidance and spiritual support from Fr Ken, and the parish community, providing them with a nurturing environment in which to develop their faith and personal values.

Through this close partnership, OLA School not only imparts religious knowledge but also fosters a deep sense of spirituality, morality, and community. Students learn to embrace the core tenets of Catholic faith, including love, compassion, and service to others. They are encouraged to put these teachings into practice in their everyday lives, making faith an active and tangible aspect of their education.

As part of the staff faith development, all staff attended a PD on the parts pf the mass earlier this year. The presenter talked about the different parts of the mass and their meaning. It gave the staff, especially the younger staff, a great understanding of why certain practices have been included in the mass and what they mean.

In essence, Catholic faith is not just a subject at OLA School; it is a way of life and a guiding force that shapes the character and values of the students. The strong connection with the OLA Parish ensures that faith remains at the heart of the educational experience, providing a solid foundation for students to live purposeful and spiritually fulfilling lives.

Education (Learning)


OLA achieved pleasing results in 2023 across all domains. The school performed above the CEWA, state and national benchmark for all assessments in Years 3 and 5. In particular, our Year 3 cohort performed well above CEWA, state and national norms and are to be commended on their efforts. Our Year 5 group performed above expectations as well, surpassing CEWA, state and national norms across all assessed areas.

Year 3 Data - Compared to CEWA, State and National NAPLAN Data







Year 5 Data - Compared to CEWA, State and National NAPLAN Data




Staff have explored the data in detail with our school support consultant during a PLC and will continue to use the data plan in 2024. As the style of assessment was different this year, schools are unable to determine growth in student achievement. The assessments were adaptive, that is each student receives a different set of questions based on the accuracy of their answers provided. The assessment is tailored to their level of achievement. With time and support, we will continue to decipher the data so that we can give our students to improve in all areas of literacy and numeracy. Assessments in the Progressive Achievement Tests (PAT) will continue to be included in our testing, in the early years and will used to plan and cater for the needs of the students.

As communicated to all community members recently (teacher placements for 2024), and the new Enterprise Bargaining Agreement (EBA) for Teachers being implemented in schools in 2024, we continue to value add to OLA and at the same **time look at ways to reduce the teachers' workload (as part of their EBA** agreement). In 2024 we have decided to appoint a Digital Technologies Teacher (PP-Year 6) who will be the coordinator and teacher of Digital Technologies from Pre-Primary to Year 6. Since arriving at OLA, we have value added by introducing HaSS teachers, Science and now a Digital Technology Teachers. Combined with the Music, Italian and Physical Education teachers, we continue to diversify and explore many different ways to provide the best possible education for our students.

Very good results in BRLA (Religious Education) can be credited to the teaching, engaged students, and a strong RE program. Students are not only acquiring



knowledge about the Catholic doctrine, but also developing critical thinking skills, ethical awareness, and a deeper understanding of the cultural and historical contexts of their faith. Further analysis will be conducted, in the new year, of the Year 5 results and support will be offered to these students in Year 6.

With the new EBA being implemented in 2024 and beyond for teachers, and in reference to the reduced teacher work hours, moving forward parents will be encouraged and invited to coordinate and assist at some of these events.

A huge thank you to all staff members who have taken on extra responsibilities in supporting the parish as well as external agencies. Staff have worked tirelessly to support Caritas (Project Compassion), LifeLink Appeal, St Vincent de Paul (Winter/Summer and Food Drives), Jeans Friday and Wheelchair For Kids organisations, as well as supporting the students with altar serving training for our parish and clubs. We are not separate to our church and our beliefs and ideals are one. Thank you to everyone in this wonderful community who supported these initiatives with donations and allowing their children to be active members within our parish.

The inclusion of wellness programs at OLA, over the last few years, reflects a growing recognition of the importance of both mental and physical health in the overall well-being of students and staff. These programs contribute significantly to the holistic development of students, fostering a positive and supportive environment that goes beyond academic achievements. A huge thank you to the staff who have taken on this initiative at OLA and have made it enjoyable occasions at OLA. This initiative will continue in 2024 and beyond.

In late 2022, the idea of a service dog at OLA was put forward to me. Since deciding we would proceed with a service dog, we were given Snoopy as a gift **and we haven't looked back. With all his service training during the year,** Snoopy has been an exemplary **'staff member' at OLA. Snoopy has looked after** children who have anxiety (they visit him regularly), upset about leaving their parents in the morning and on many other occasions. He seems to have the ability be able to pick those children who need the greatest support. As he spends time in the classrooms, he has been trained to sit quietly and interact with children when he is given permission.

The audit commended the school's emphasis on holistic development, encompassing not only academic achievement but also extracurricular involvement. The auditor also highlighted the commitment to maintaining high standards of transparency, accountability, and continuous improvement throughout the evaluation process.

The exemplary status attained in the audit reflects the collective efforts of the entire school community, educators, students, and parents who work collaboratively to uphold and enhance the quality of education provided. CEWA have stated because of our high standing in our recent audit, they will be using our school as a model for other schools.
